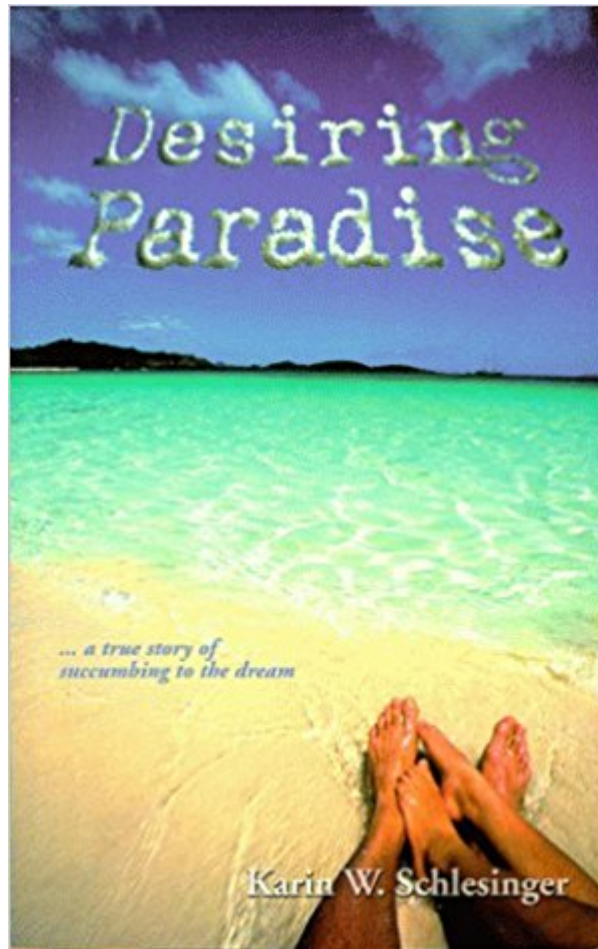




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# Desiring Paradise... A True Story Of Succumbing To The Dream

I was pleasantly surprised at how easy it was to get on the car ferry at Red Hook. The operation is a smooth one. She was right about St. John and how beautiful it is. Everything is so clean and pristine on St. John. My Favorite spot in St. John was Leinster Bay and snorkeling Waterlemon Cay. We saw everything from baby trunk fish to green sea turtles, and the best part was that there was hardly anyone there. We also went to Coral bay and she was right on that too. The wild donkeys and goats are neat. I really wanted to know how the author and her husband are these days so I would love to ready a follow up story.

I seriously wanted to love this book since my family is in the process of making the big decision of weather or not to take the giant 'leap of faith' as well. There is just WAY too much background material before getting into the actual moving sequences. I know the characters are real people but the way it is written they seem like robots. By this I mean that everything seems to be told that 'we did this, then this, then that' in rapid fire succession .... and most times in the same paragraph. Don't get me wrong, anybody in the same situation as me will definitely get info and tips out of this book but it seems more of an instruction manual than an entertaining read. That being said, I still got enough ideas out of the book that it was a worthwhile purchase.

We had just returned from our first trip to St. John. I scoured the internet for books on this incredible island just wanting more, more, more! I was intrigued by the title (feeling much the same!) and ordered. It wasn't too far in that I realized Ms. Schlesinger is a very self-absorbed woman - I didn't count the number of references to "I" but "I" got sick of reading about inconveniences - she seemed more to want us to feel sorry for her, having to move to St. John! Get over it! The number of people she inconvenienced along her way to paradise far outnumbered her own inconveniences - I felt sorry for her poor husband. The few references to St. John, the island, the beaches, lifestyle etc. were wonderfully refreshing - it was reliving the pure pleasure we experienced on our first short visit. We just returned from our 2nd trip and I decided to re-read the book to again relive our trip. I was struck again, even harder this time, that this book is more about the author than St. John. Who cares? Skimming through the book to find the few times we are actually introduced to the life on St. John, I read every word and enjoyed it all. If someone is interested in learning about St. John this is NOT the book to buy. I gave it 2 stars only because of the references to the island, not her writing skills. I would have enjoyed reading this much more perhaps, had it been written by Mr. Schlesinger, who seems far more down to earth and less selfish!

I have to admit that I skipped entire sections of this book because I just kept waiting and waiting for it to get better. I desperately wanted it to capture the true essence of life in the Virgin Islands. Instead, I labored through prolonged descriptions of the completely mundane aspects of Ms. Schlesinger's daily life, like going to the post office. I live in St. Thomas and having moved here from the United States with less than \$3,000 in my bank account and only having five WEEKS to move, I cannot understand why Ms. Schlesinger might think her long range plans of moving and packing might even be remotely exciting. The book should have described more of the actual daily

life here in the Virgin Islands rather than how difficult and scary it is for her to drive her car onto the barge (give me a break!). I'm surprised she even managed to move down here at all! I give Ms. Schlesinger credit for writing the book, I just think that she could have done so much better. What about the Bomba parties on Tortola where five hundred people cram themselves into a 300 square foot wooden surf shack on the beach on every full moon night? What about renting a car from a leading rental car company and being given a shot of Jagermeister by the agent before being given the keys to the rental car?? That's just part of ONE day in the islands. Well, maybe my life is just more exciting than Ms. Schlesingers'! Perhaps I will just have to write my own book.....Stay tuned!

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
