

This book is not just a great book on feminist theology; that would be a merit in itself. It is, however, also an important statement on the doctrine of God in Christian theology. For me, it will continue to be an important resource for my own theological work. The greatness of this work is that it blends feminist deconstruction with the wealth of the tradition. She accomplishes the impossible by bringing the two together, preserving both the insights of the past with the liberative elements in feminist discourse. Very powerful and important book!

Here’s a snippet of my book review: As an African-American Christian woman, I understand the need for liberationist theologies. While I am not an avid supporter of the feminist theological movement, I understand the premise in which it has been established. Johnson was successful in her endeavor of presenting a balanced and graceful argument for the need to introduce and utilize female language for God within a Christian context. From my reading, I am drawn to the conclusion that SHE WHO IS will advance the discussion of God from a Christian feminist perspective. My main reservations about the book is Johnson’s view that speech about God in exclusively male terminology undermines women’s dignity and equality as being created in the image of God. As a woman I do not agree that traditional or patriarchal terminology about God undermines women being created in the imago Dei. Genesis 1:27 clearly states that, “So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created them; male and female He created them.” This verse alone empowers rather than weakens the view of women as created in the imago Dei. While I disagree that current speech about God undermines female equality, I agree with Johnson’s claims that new speech about God can be welcomed as long as it reveals the character of the GOD WHO IS mediated through the Scripture. Possessing no initial knowledge of the feminist theological movement, I enjoyed the vast amount of information presented by Johnson in SHE WHO IS. This complex, academic read is one that I would recommend to women as a resource to broaden perspectives on speech about God.

I am sorry I did not read this earlier in my journey. It is well written and the back up research is very solid. When you find this kind of treasure, you wonder if you have been hoodwinked. Every Christian should read this as well as folks from all spiritual paths.

This should be taught in every theology course. It's not "bash the guys" feminism. It shows other dimensions of the "white bearded male and his long brown haired son" God. Not better or worse, but more.

I found this book difficult and challenging to negotiate through. That's not necessarily a bad thing. While I am a professional person with a Master's degree, I found the language/vocabulary made it very slow reading. I believe this would deter a less-educated person from reading this work, which is unfortunate because Elizabeth has so many insightful and inspiring things to say--if you can get to them through the language. "Scholarly" work doesn't have to be unreachable for the "common" person. When she allows herself to be poetic, the language is simple and the imagery is not only exquisite but crystal clear. An example of this is her description of the Spirit in a trinitarian framework: "If God as origin is pictured as the sun, and God incarnate as the beam of that same light streaming to the earth (Christ the sunbeam), then Spirit is the point of light that actually arrives and affects the earth with warmth and energy. And it is all the one shining light." Exquisite! Trinity is not an easy concept to grasp or feel "in relationship" with. But this image did it for me!

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
