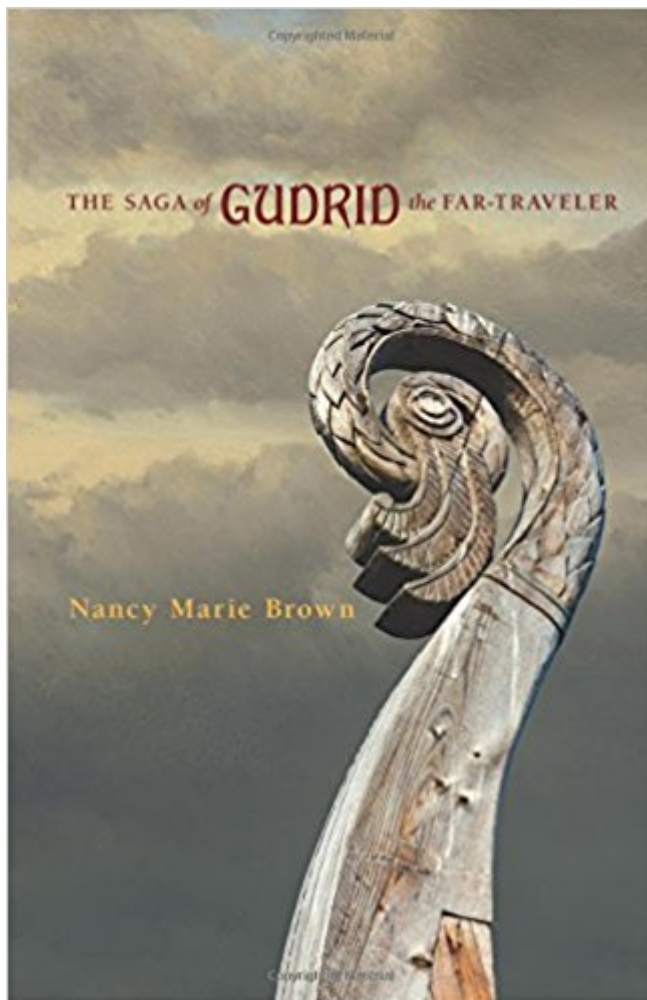

Gr 10 Up “Gudrid is the daughter of an Icelandic chieftain, and she has been promised in marriage to Leif Eiriksson” but she wants to marry Einar because “he’s young and rich and handsome and he owns a ship.” She and Einar elope to Greenland. Gudrid has an adventurous spirit and sets her

sights on settling eventually in Wine Land, that is, North America. But before she makes it that far, she is shipwrecked, widowed, and remarried, survives an epidemic that kills her second husband, considers becoming a nun, and then marries her third husband. Brown's account of Gudrid's legendary adventures is too short to fully encapsulate the saga, and the result is that most of the plot points feel rushed and few of the characters are well developed. The work also lacks the emotional depth. However, this book will have an appeal to readers with an interest in Norse history, and it comes complete with an author's note explaining what is known of Gudrid's identity and life. The narrative includes frequent brief but vivid descriptions of the Scandinavian setting, including a walrus hunt, sightings of the Northern Lights, and the final journey toward Wine Land where "The gray cliffs unrolled against the sky. [The ship] cut cleanly through the green sea, kicking up ripples." I read the 200-page novel The Saga of Gudrid the Far Traveler in one night!The novel flows easily and does not get bogged down in excessive details or require a PhD in history to follow! I have read several novels based on Scandinavian history and Norse Mythology that required much more effort to follow! Having read the non-fiction book first, I already had a sense of the characters and their real-life journey, however a casual reader could easily follow this novel without that background information.As a reader, the most important aspect of a novel for me is Voice and Character Development. I thoroughly enjoyed Nancy Marie Brown's characters in all their flaws and glory! There were some plot twists I saw coming and a few I did not! Overall it was an enjoyable experience.As a side note, for some this novel may not be salacious enough! There is little mention

of sex or violence! This novelization of the Viking Era does not include graphic battle scenes, raping and pillaging or explicit sexual passages! This is essentially an adventure story and exploration of Gudrid's character journey. While characters do marry, have sex and kill one another along the way, the author prefers to bring attention to the Saga and the characters themselves. In conclusion, I would definitely recommend this novel, as well as Nancy Marie Brown's other works.

I've read Nancy Marie Brown's published non-fiction works pertaining to medieval times, *The Abacus and the Cross* and *The Far Traveler*. Her first novel, conveys how tough and intricate cultural life was in Iceland and Greenland during Norse times. She gives defined personalities to the characters. The heroine, Gudrid, has to continuously learn and grow, facing restrictions for women in Norse culture, as well as terrible adversities both on sea and land. Brown reveals the vast knowledge a woman of the time needed to help run a farm and ship. Gudrid was an amazing traveler.

While this is nicely written, it was a bit stale and safe. I preferred the author's non-fiction book on this saga heroine. Author is a great, and I mean great, non-fiction writer about these topics, but fiction --- not so much.
