

As a whole the book is very disappointing and hardly useful for a college class. I do not recommend it. The Introduction is particularly bad. How does the author expect to arouse interest in European cinema if she keeps saying it is hardly alive? And this is right in the beginning. Some individual chapters written by other people are good and even excellent though, especially the one on Soviet Cinema (the best in my opinion), Weimar Cinema, Scandinavian Cinema and German Cinema. The last chapter is empty talk. The book lacks continuity and is confusing for students. Also, how do you manage to write a book, a manual on European cinema without writing about Andrej Tarkovsky? Not even a paragraph?! He is mentioned twice, once in the Introduction, once in the end, the second mentioning missing from the Index. The Index is wrong all over though, some names are mentioned in the book without appearing in the Index, so it is deceiving and unreliable. Louis Malle is not mentioned at all! No, I am dreaming. Shame on the editor, in my opinion, since some chapter authors deserve recognition on their own.

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
