The characters are hilarious and easy to relate to in how they tackle the quests and problems thrown at them in the "Game" world of Caverns and Creatures. At first, I admit, when the book started and all you had was the initial dialogue from the main characters, the immature and insulting remarks almost made the book seem like it would be that way in its entirety but I was quickly corrected as I kept reading when Robert really began to paint pictures with his words to describe the scenes from the typical grubby food joint in the modern world to the massive city of Cardinia inside the Caverns and Creatures game. The four main characters really grew on me quickly as well due to how they remind me of myself and my friends. I also loved the way Robert Bevan mixed fantasy and modern cultures with how the NPC's (Non Player Characters) in the game actually believe their world is real and the fools talking about Hit Points and Ability Scores are completely out of their minds. The first book seemed to end rather abruptly and in a way I didn't expect but by the time I read the ending, I was eager to see what happened next and immediately bought the next book in the series and I wasn't disappointed at all. For those new to fantasy books and for those familiar with the genre, I highly recommend Critical Failures as well as the the d6 Caverns and Creatures short stories.

I started to love this series from the moment I started reading. The cast of characters are so damn funny and say the most outrageous things, I kept getting strange and irritated looks from laughing out loud. Anyone who has ever played a table top or RPG has played with characters just like the ones we meet here. You don't have to be a fan of role playing games though, to enjoy this series, it's a great and fun ride for all! Great series I recommend to any reader!

This is what went through my head when I considered buying: A D&D novel? YEAH, those are usually real good. Never mind. Only \$.99..because it sucks?. If I hadn't played D&D back in the day (2E!), and I had a rake up my ass, I probably would give this 3.5 stars. But for sheer enjoyment, I give this an easy 5 stars. It's so nice to read something that doesn't take itself too seriously. I look forward to Critical Failures II.

If you grew up playing D&D as a kid, this will bring back some serious memories. Where everything changes is when the Dungeo- I mean, Cavern Master, gets pissed off at being ridiculed and uses his magic dice to send the players into the game world itself as their characters, complete with stat sheets! The characters are really fun, the dialog and situations are funny, and I was so wrapped up in the story, that I purchased the complete 4 novel set to find out what happens next. This series is NOT for kids though, as the characters are in their 20's-30's and use plenty of raunchy language, sex, violence, etc. For the rest of us though, the tales are funny, and thrilling, with plenty of nostalgia, and fart jokes. I highly recommend this series and this author. Apparently there are some additional short story collections that take place in the same universe, and I'm looking forward to checking those out soon as well. Do yourself a favor...if you can download the first volume for free, do it, and I bet you'll do what I did, and get the rest. Very fun read.
